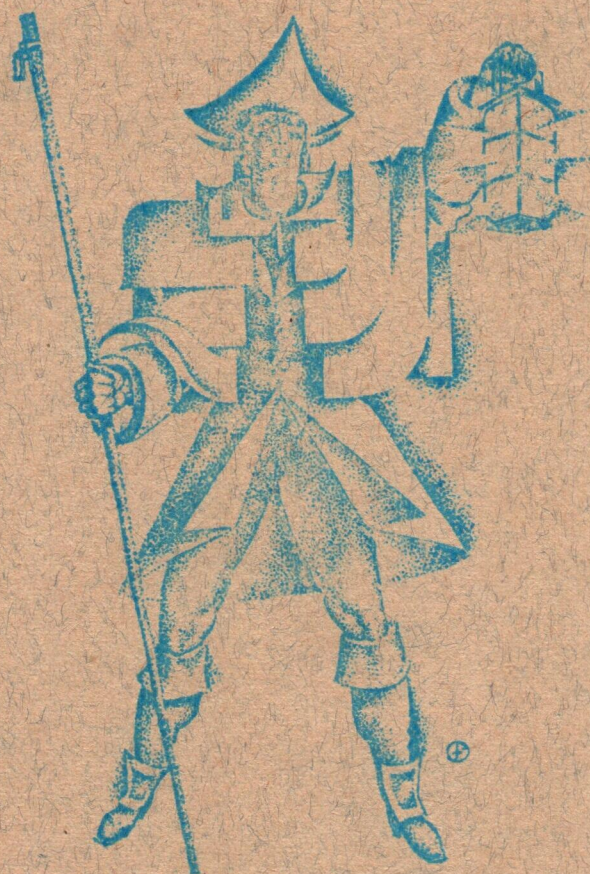

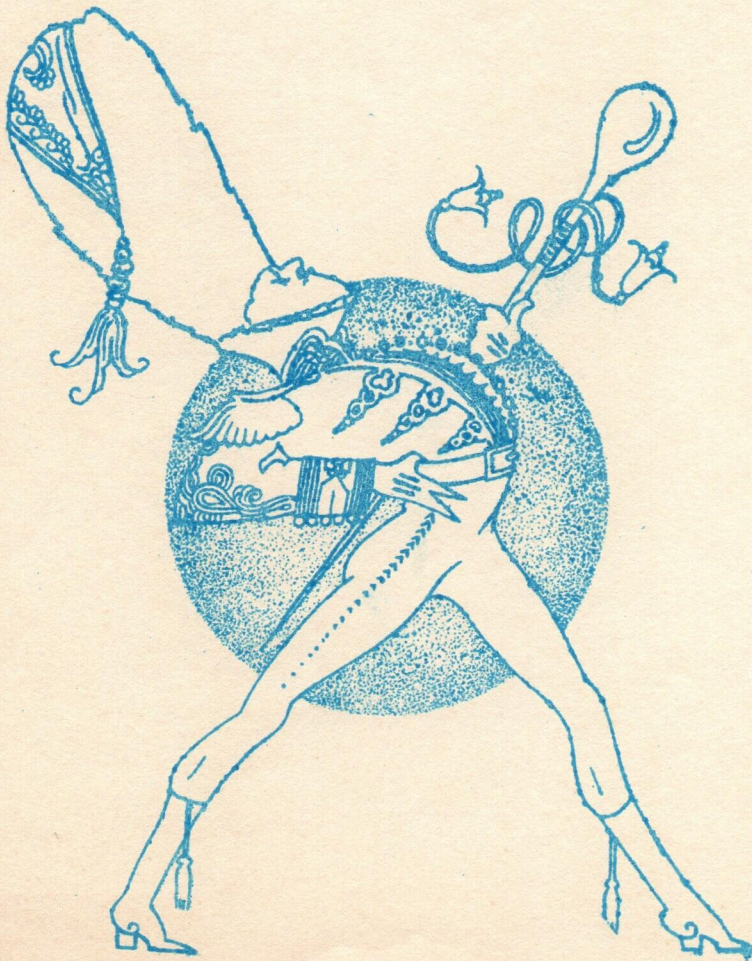

A successful convention, both financially and otherwise, seems assured. The program advertising is practically sold-out at this early date; the Bourse space is filling up, the housing requests are coming in faster than what the birds are migrating to the north,- yes, even Big Cedar Lake has 'opened-up' fully three weeks earlier than other years. The judges for the exhibition have been engaged; the Master of Ceremony, the entertainment and the trophies have been secured; the exhibition hall has been completely renovated for the occasion. The hostess reports that the plans to entertain the ladies have been completed and that they call for two days of entertainment. And what about the

Convention Highlights,-

The 22nd Annual Convention-Exhibition-Bourse of the Wisconsin Federation of Stamp Clubs will open its doors at 10 A.M. Saturday, May 23rd, 1953 with the playing of our National Anthem. More than 400 frames of stamps are expected at this exhibition with a valuation in excess of \$50,000.00. The Bourse, scheduled as the number ONE attraction, will be conducted in the spacious Exhibition Hall with each dealer occupying an eight foot table with ample seating for his guests. Mrs Don Thurwatcher, of Oshkosh, will, during the bourse, demonstrate the art of Shell Craft, something that should interest all ladies. In speaking of the ladies, all those interested will be invited, as guests of the Collector's Club of West Bend, to a guided three (3) hour tour of Holy Hill, a Nationally famous shrine, of Paradise Valley, Little Cedar Lake, Silver Lake and Lizard Mound State Park. This tour will begin at 2 P.M. Saturday, in front of the entrance to the Exhibition Hall. The ladies are asked to register for this tour at the registration desk in the exhibition hall by 1 P.M. in order that ample bus service may be provided for. (Registrations thereto will also be accepted by mail prior to that time. In doing so please advise and address your request to E.J. Franzel, exhibition chairman, Slinger, Wis.).

The regular business meeting of the Wisconsin Federation of Stamp Clubs will be called to order by the President, E.J. Franzel, at 2:30 P.M. in the regular dining room which is adjacent to the cocktail lounge.

(Article VI, Section 3 of the Constitution of the Wisconsin Federation of Stamp Clubs (May 22, 1948 revision), to wit: "When meeting in Annual Convention the Executive Committee shall be increased in that each Member Club shall elect or choose two (2) Delegates to represent them in place of the Single Director. These two (2) Delegates shall carry but a single vote between them. Each member club may elect or appoint a suitable number of alternates to assure representation in Convention on the above basis. In emergencies, the President of a member club may name his Delegates on the Convention floor, but in this case the members of the Executive Committee already seated shall be final judges of whether such an emergency exists, and whether or not they choose to recognize the emergency appointment.")

The usual banquet will be held in the center of the Exhibition Hall at 6:30 P.M., Saturday May 23rd to be followed by an attractive floor show and entertainment scheduled not to extend beyond 9 P.M. Upon the conclusion thereof the true-hearted collector may again enjoy the bourse, while the ladies adjourn to the smaller dining room for cards, bunco, etc., with prizes for each table having been provided for.

At 11:59 P.M. the Footloose Filatelists will convene in this same dining room (with the ladies having politely been ousted) for their Annual Meeting. At this same time the interested ladies will get-together in the home of Vivian, located just a very short ways from the Exhibition Hall, to organize themselves as the ' Fancy-Free ' (or what have you)

The Annual meeting of the Wisconsin Postal History society will be held Sunday at 10 A.M. in the dining room in a breakfast meeting with Chas. Peirce presiding. Visitors are welcome at this meeting

The first Annual Meeting of the Wisconsin Chapter of the American Topical Association, a new affiliate to the Wisconsin Federation of Stamp Clubs, has been scheduled for 2:30 P.M. Sunday, May 24th, in the dining room. This meeting will be highlighted with the showing of colored 35 mm slides of "Flowers on Stamps", prepared by the Biology Unit of the American Topical Association. This will consist of a series of slides of flowers in their natural habitat, photographed by outstanding Naturalists. These will be followed by a group of slides showing various types and treatment of album pages on flowers. Through the courtesy of the Maximum Card Society of America their loan collection of slides on Maximum Cards will also be shown. Everyone is invited and welcomed to attend this scheduled attraction.

Special entertainment has been provided for the ladies on Sunday Afternoon. Further announcement thereto will be made at the time of the banquet.

During the program, Max Schnell was presented with two beautiful Wisconsin Territorial covers from Columbia county. These items will add to Mr. Schnell's Postal History collection of Columbia County, which has already become a sizeable collection.

Mr. Ray Van Handel, Sr. presented the covers on behalf of the club for the fine services he has performed for the club during the past years.

Present at the Banquet was Mr. Fred W. Noske and Mrs Noske; E.J. Franzel and Mrs. E.J. Franzel. Mr. Noske was the guest speaker and his theme was "Weeds in a Philatelic Garden" dealing with frauds and forgeries of stamp rarities. Mr. Noske is well posted on forgeries and frauds, having served on the extertising committee of the American Philatelic Society for the past twenty years. He has also been a member of the Milwaukee Philatelic Society for more than 46 years and today holds the distinction of being oldest active member of that society. Mr. Noske was also one of the founders of the Temple Stamp Club of Milw.

A Novel place card was used at the Banquet in the form of a Philatelic cover. The envelope showed the person's name and a design symbolizing the Club's twentieth Anniversary was cleverly applied. A Commemorative stamp was cancelled at the exact time of the Banquet. It provided the guests with a novel remembrance of the event. Willis Zimmermann was the program chairman assisted by Ray Van Handel Jr.

The Sheboygan Stamp Club started the new year with a rather novel idea. They are sending out birthday cards cancelled on the date of some collector's Birthday and from a town cancellation of that person's name, either surname or given name. Up to the present time they are limiting this to their members only. They hope to exhibit this material in 1954 and thus far have been able to comply with all requests! (They must have an awful lot of Lincoln's, Arthur's and Franklin's in their club)

For the past several months the members of this lively club have been enjoying Kilo mixtures at every meeting at 1¢ per stamp. After two pickings the remainder is auctioned off to the highest bidder and they order out another mixture. Thus far the club has come out ahead financially on this kind of a deal and the members have had oodles of fun. It's the same old story, one must take stamps home following a meeting or what has he had out of the meeting,- nothing.

At present the members of the Sheboygan club are in discussion on how to build your own album pages. Their instructor, and he is a very good one too, is Ray Van Handel, Sr. This is an illustrated lecture and members of other clubs are invited to attend. Work has also begun on a program for the year with regional stamp rally as a theme. It is the firm belief that there should be more exchange of stamps between members of the Federation. There certainly is plenty of material available. 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WISCONSIN POSTAL HISTORY SOCIETY,-

We are at a complete loss as to just how to begin to describe the recent Bulletin (no.5) of the Wisconsin Postal History Society now in our possession. The Bulletin consists of 153 drawings or tracing of Nineteenth Century Fancy Cancellations of Wisconsin. The calligraphy is something out of this world. (If we could not replace this item, we wouldn't part with it for any price). Yet we paid but 50¢ for it. The work is definitely a masterpiece of,-- well, you might guess,-- Ray Van Handel, Sr. 221 Park Ave., Sheboygan, Wis., If you are at all interested in Philately to the least degree this bulletin is a MUST in a philatelic Library. I have given you the address as to where to order your copy as well as the price thereof. The drawings consist of circular designs, 'donuts', geometric designs, maltese crosses, alphabetical designs, railroad markings, U.S. designs, shields, anatomical and other fascinating markings, hand cut stars, flowers and bees, circles, targets and grids. All these fancy cancellations have been found on Wisconsin covers.

Report of the Meeting of the
EXECUTIVE BOARD of the W.F.S.C.
Sunday, February 15th, 1953.

The third and final meeting of the Executive Board of the W.F.S.C. held at the Town Grill in Oshkosh found all members present except Mr. C.H. Zimbrick, Secty.-Treas. who was confined to his home due to illness. In the absence of Mr. Zimbrick, Carl Light, S.E. Reg. Vice-Pres. acted as Secty. Pro-tem. A brief review of past meetings was related by E.J. Franzel, President. It was brought to the attention of the board that no one has given any indication of being interested in serving as host to the 1954 Convention-Exhibition. That from a survey made during Mr. Franzel's visits to the many clubs during the first 9 months of his tenure of office, there are but a limited number of clubs that are in a position to handle such an event. Mr. Franzel suggested that two or possibly three clubs get-together and jointly stage the annual event. The Neenah-Menash, Outagamie and Green Bay coalition was brought up. It was further agreed that in the event that no one bids for the 1954 Convention that the Federation consider one of the following plans; (1) To conduct a one day Convention-Bourse-Banquet, with NO exhibition; (2) A one day Convention-Bourse-Banquet together with a one exhibit per club with all entry fees returned as prizes; (3) Convention-Banquet and Auction (No bourse or exhibition). In the event of the number 2 choice, i.e. a one exhibit per club, it was suggested that each individual club stage an annual exhibition of its own and that the Club then pay the entry fee for their winning exhibit to this Convention-Exhibition.
