FROM THE PRESIDENT:

FELLOW MEMBERS OF THE WISCONSIN FEDERATION OF STAMP CLUBS.

In my letter in the last issue of the Bulletin, I dedicated myself to keep in contact with the other officers of the Federation, which I have done thru the mail. Up to this date I have not received any replies to my letters, however, I am mindful of the summer weather and vacation time but I am still looking for those replies.

Our hard working Editor of the Bulletin tells me that he has not received too much material from the clubs for publication in this issue, so perhaps I can fill up a page or so if it will be worth reading.

I have been reading some of the past issues of the American Philatelic Society that Leon Christenson has been kind enough to forward to me (Thanks Leon). In the June issue I came across the Presidents Message by Edward L. Willard where he commented on the cooperation from postal clerks shown to stamp collectors - or perhaps I should say lack of cooperation. It is true when he says that the stamp collectors are the Post Office best customers when you take into consideration that no other service is involved than handing the stamps over the counter. One thousand percent profit on the sale. The postal clerks should realize the collectors are not satisfied with any copies which may be on the top of the pile, but be given their just consideration, provided it comes within the limits of the Postal Rules and Regulations. You do get better treatment from second and third class post offices. I have seen many people buy full sheets of stamps only to tear off the plate block margin because they have no reason to keep it. Perhaps a suggestion could be made here that to those customers half sheets could be sold and leave the half with the plate block for the collector who they know will be in very soon and be glad to get it.

I used to buy full mint sheets but have come to the conclusion that they do not have enough value to keep and use up space in my collection. Ten plate blocks are worth a heck of a lot more than one mint sheet and I do not have enough

correspondence to use up the stamps left over before the next issue is out. So - FOR SALE- mint sheets in the 3 and 4 cent issues.

Further commenting on articles by Mr. Willard and others I would like to mention something about the Christmas Stamp issues by our United States. I firmly feel that a Christmas Stamp is fine if it represents the true spirit of Christmas. With all the commercialism going on at that time, maybe it will help some people to realize just what Christmas is about. We are supposed to be a Christian nation and commemorate the fact on coins and currency, so what's wrong with stamps also, just not showing partiality to any religious group or sect, but to Christ Himself.

One thing more I would like to mention and then I shall have my allotted space filled. U. S. stamp issues have at times gone the limit when they commemorate chickens and dogs, just to mention a few. Also the work in designing and not forgetting the printing and colors. I would not be far from the truth when I say that most foreign stamps have the U. S. issues beat in those departments. In spite of this I still only collect U. S. but now select certain issues that happen to suit my interest and follow thru with matched plate blocks.

It is very true what an APS article mentioned, that our postal department at Washington will let politics play a big part in new stamp issues, but all in all, both political parties are guilty of the same practice, so we collectors can approve the ones we favor and be critics of the others. To my interest I feel that more people should be commemorated on stamps and if for no other reason it would help this modern generation remember that in the past we did have people with sane and patriotic minds.

I could go on further, but have two more bulletins to go yet and will have more then, however I would like some comments or ideas from any of you on stamp issues or something of interest that you may have included in your collection. After all, why should we reprint articles from stamp publications that have already been read by most of us. Let's have something original, in other words, our own ideas. How about it members? We will include any articles you forward, in our bulletin.

ORIGIN OF FREE CITY MAIL DELIVERY.

While it is over a hundred years since the inauguration of free city mail deliveries in the United States, the man who conceived the idea - the nations "first postman" remains unhonored and unsung.

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Few people in the country or even in the Postal Service recall the name of Joseph W. Briggs, yet millions benefit daily from an idea that came to him on a cold and miserable day during the Civil War.

Briggs was a clerk and assistant to the postmaster at Cleveland, Ohio. At that time most people picked up their mail at their city Post Office. During the frigid winter of 1862-1863, Briggs noted how wives and sweethearts waited outside the post office for hours in the cold blustery weather for mail from their loved ones.

The compassionate Briggs suggested to the postmaster that the mail be sorted out and taken to grocery stores throughout the city for distribution to people in each area. The novel proposal was accepted. It was adopted and it passed and proved successful.

Briggs then went a step further. He suggested that mail be delivered free to homes by uniformed letter carriers. This proposal met with considerable opposition, for a system of mail deliveries already existed in cities. But Briggs pointed out, most people did not avail themselves of this service for the letter carriers had to be paid for each piece of mail delivered to the home. That didn't faze Briggs. He persevered, and on March 3, 1863, Congress passed a law authorizing free city mail delivery.

Briggs didn't rest on his laurels. He worked out a plan of mail delivery and collection for Cleveland. The postmaster then named him as the first letter carrier and it was the militant Briggs who designed the uniform to be worn.

In recognition of his work, the postmaster in Lincoln's cabinet, Montgomery Blair, appointed Briggs to set up a new mail delivery service in the country. The new service went into effect July 1, 1863, and during July and August of that year it was established in 49 cities.

"THE SLAVE SAVIOR"

In the northwestern corner of Sheboygan County, a stream called Onion River, flows through a little settlement called Winooski. This little Hamlet has some of the most historical and interesting happenings in the United States pertaining to the slavery question of the Civil War.

Captain Jonathan Walker bought 20 acres of land on the Winooski Mill Pond in 1858 and lived there for five years before moving to Muskegon, Michigan, dying there fifteen years later.

This Jonathan Walker was the only man in the U. S. history to be branded "Slave Stealer" under a Federal Court order. The letters "S. S." were branded or burnt into the palm of his right hand. Besides a year in solitary confinement, he was also given a heavy fine.

Walker was one of America's first anti-slave crusaders, by aiding escaped slaves to reach a colony of fugitive slaves in Mexico. In 1844 he gave passage aboard his Bahama bound ship to seven fleeing slaves. After being overtaken by a government ship, he was captured and returned to Florida in chains.

After being found guilty and on November 18, 1844 Captain Walker was led into the courtroom for sentencing. At this time the judge ordered Walker to be branded on the right hand with the letters "S. S." signifying "Slave Stealer". He was branded with a red hot branding iron like those that are used in the western states on cattle.

After serving his prison term, he lectured in the northern states against slavery. The battle cry against the cruelties of slavery through the north was Jonathan Walker's name. Walker also wrote several books one about his experiences and the other one was propaganda of slave conditions in the south.

During the years that he lectured, John Greenleaf Whittier heard about Walker and wrote a poem "The Man With the Branded Hand". Eventually the poem was put to music and sung at anti-slavery rallies, and during the Civil War.

At his death on May 1, 1878, the United States Government and the people of Muskegon erected a monument to Captain Walker at the entrance to the cemetery at Muskegon. On one side was carved a branded hand with the letters "S.S." with the new northern interpretation "Slave Savior". Walker's contribution of the Civil War makes him one of the greatest heroes.

After serving his prison term, he returned in the northern states against slavery. The battle cry against the restriction of slavery through the North was Jonathan Walker's name. Walker also wrote several books and about his experience and the other one was propaganda of slave conditions in the South.

During the years that he lived in Michigan, John Greenleaf Whittier heard about Walker and wrote a poem "The Slave Ship" and the "Branded Hand". Eventually the poem was put to music and sung as anti-slavery rallies, and during the Civil War.

At his death on May 1, 1898, the United States Government and the people of Michigan erected a monument to Captain Walker as the evidence to the bravery of his actions. On the side was carved a wooden hand with the letters "S. S." with the new northern inscription "Slave Savior". Walker was a tributor of the Civil War and one of the greatest heroes.
