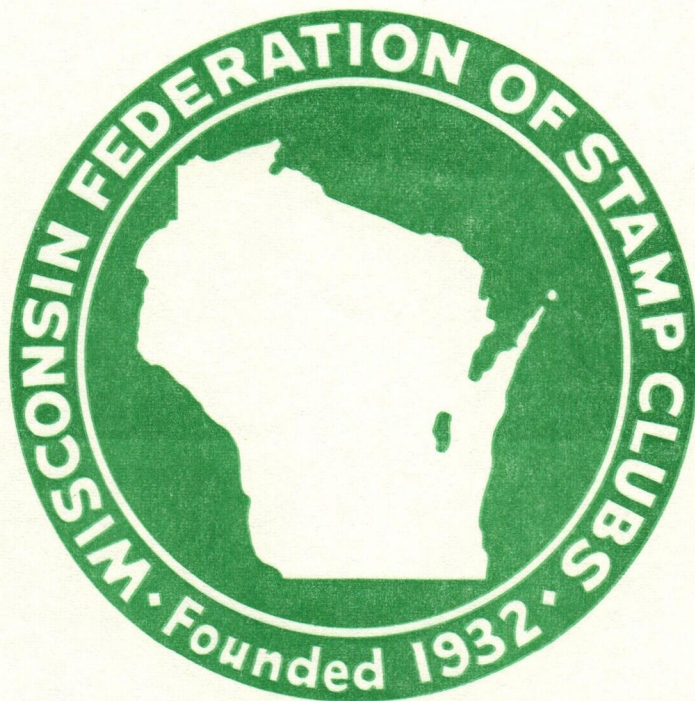

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Fellow Members of Wisconsin Federation
of Stamp Clubs:

Time is passing and by now everyone should be getting their exhibits ready for the Convention and Exhibition at Madison, May 6 & 7. I'm sure that the Host Club will have a place that will be convenient as well as practical to all the exhibitors, dealers and visitors who will be attending.

In the past issues of the Bulletin I have written articles I thought might be of interest to the Federation members. However, I have not heard too many comments on them. It seems to me that more of you could be writing articles also. We all have ideas and views we could pass on to the rest of the members and in that way help make the Bulletin interesting.

Of late I have been reading articles about collectors who have been robbed while away from their homes. I wonder how many of you take any precautions against this. No matter what our collection amounts to it has cost some money and time in getting it. How many of us know the true value of our collections? Especially if it were stolen or destroyed. If the collection had a great value you could expect the robbery to be by professionals. Otherwise most of the thievery is by amateurs or juveniles who think that any collection would be valuable and if not able to sell it, will destroy it to keep from getting caught with the evidence.

From what I have read and my opinion too, it is best to keep an inventory of your collection and list a value on each album you have according to the present day book value and then keep it up to date. Your loose stamps will have to be considered also as to just what their value might be, either face or back. Covers and Postal History material you may have to place a value on the time and money spent to arrange it etc. Album sheets and covers is another thing to evaluate. Most of us may have Home Owners Package Insurance and have listed an overall sum on our stamp collections.

We should also give some thought on the protection of our stamps. If we keep them at home or at the office one thing to

remember is try not to keep all the albums in one place. The most valuable should be kept separate from the others and do not keep any in a conspicuous place. A safe large enough for all is best if you are fortunate enough to have one. Extremely valuable stamps should be in the bank vault when not using them. It is only natural for us to brag about our collection which will advertise what we have and will invite someone to rob you if they have the opportunity to do it.

Charles Cratsenberg of Moline, Illinois has some very fine suggestions listed in the January issue of the American Philatelist. He knows what it means to have his collection stolen. Others have had it happen to them too, so perhaps we can all benefit from their mistakes. This would make a good topic for your club meetings sometime.

I shall be looking forward to seeing you at the Convention at Madison, May 6 & 7.

According to records on hand, the Constitution was revised in 1957 at Green Bay. Since then there has been an amendment, a resolution and a motion that have some effect on the original document. These should have been made a part of the Constitution as a supplement, and attached to the original, and copies furnished to all clubs.

I believe that the Constitution should be brought up to date as above, or completely revised. Every club should be in possession of at least several copies and then be furnished with any and all supplements as they are voted on. These supplements should be prepared and forwarded to the clubs by the State Secretary. I also note, and your Northern Regional Vice-President, John I. Franz has also noted, that there is no provision in our Constitution for filling vacancies, if and when one would occur, as it did in 1966 when Vice-President Mylener passed away. I think John will have something to offer on this.

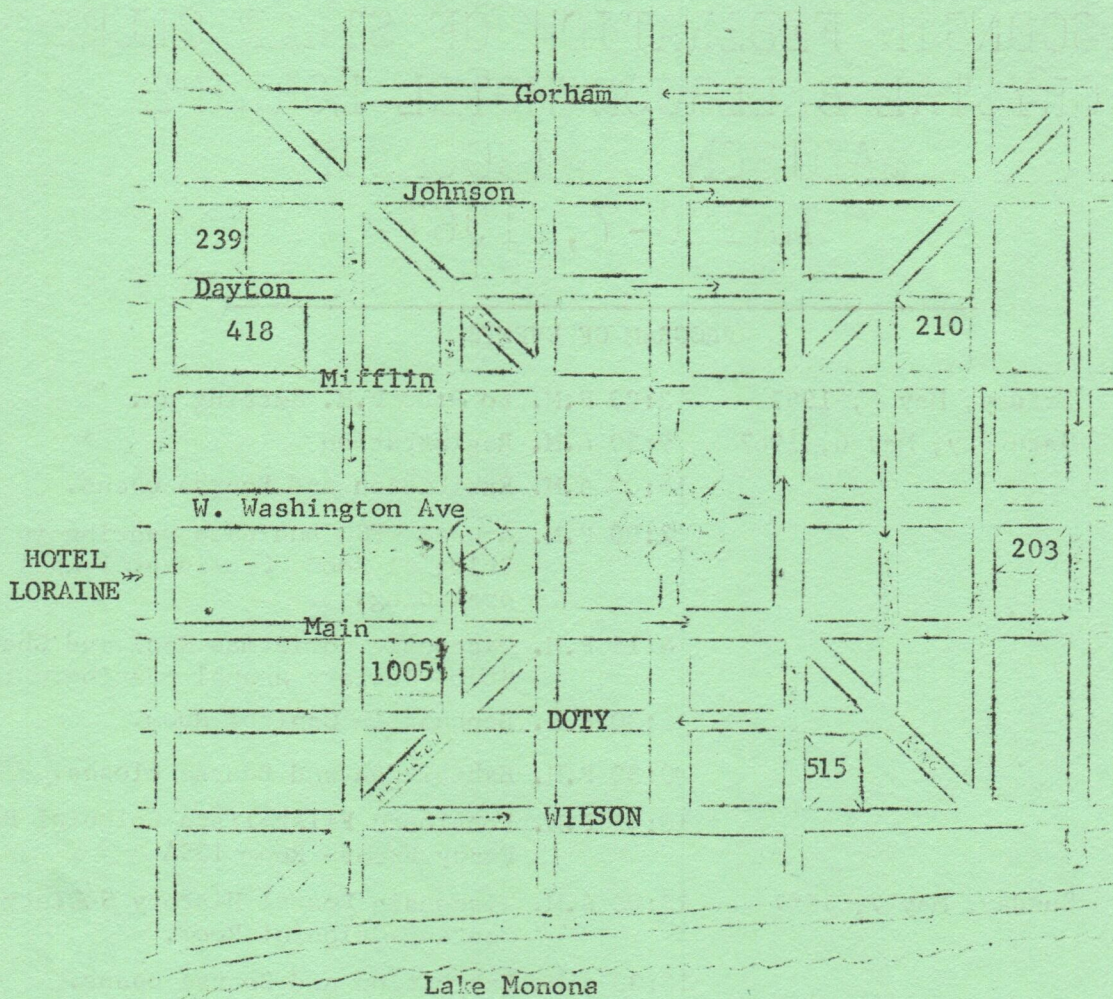
